A New Cannon.

Among the recent inventions in warapparatus are the dynamite gun and dart. The gun is a seamless brass tu be therty feet or more in length, mounted upon a light gun-carriage, and manipulated by the artillerist in the manner of an ordinary cannon. Its noiseless discharge sends the missile with a great force, conveying the powerful explosive substance within it, which is ignited at the instant of contact with the deck of aship or any object upon which it strikes. If the promises made in its behalf prove true, a single projectileof this description, with its hundred pounds of dynamite, would instantly sink the heaviest iron-clad affoat, The dart embodies some now and interesting adaptions of physics to the flight of projectiles by which great accuracy is obtained. The tendency of the wind to cause a divergence of the projectile from a direct line is to a great degree overcome; and the pressure of the wind, whether light or heavy, is made to retract in proportion to its force upon the missile and to direct its flight in the line of original projection. This pecularity consists in the unusual length of the projectile, and the location of its centre of gravity considerably nearer the forward end-thus a wind blowing across its course will act upon the lighter and enlarged rear end as on a vane, causing the projectile to prvot upon its centre gravity, and head into the wind in proportion to the wind's velocity, the missile maintaining ap proximity its original direction. It depends for its flight upon the force of air compressed by powerful engines to the pressure of 1,000 pounds to the square inch. Tais is stored in large reservoirs from which a sufficient amount for single discharge is suddenly liberated into the gun through a connecting pipe by means of an automatic valve, which may be regulated to open and close in the tenth of a second, admitting of dis changes in quick succession, while the air compressing engines, securely le cated in the subterranean depths of the foot of the hold of the ship, main

tain the required pressure in the air, teservoirs. One of the advantages claimed for this invention is its adaptability to harbor and river defences, owing to the small cost and short time requsite to construct the neccessary apparatus. No special machinery or tools are required, as any shop suitable for constructing steam engines could be used without the cost and time required to build a Woolrich arsenal and shops. To defend rivers and harbors it is said that small steam launches provided with dynamite guns and apparatus could be effectually used agaist armored ships; and even smaller craft with portable reservoirs, previously prepared could, under cover of darkness, hurl these destructive charges of dynamite upon the deck of a ship without disclosing to the enemy their location, by flash or sound of gunpowder, or the sparks from a steamer's funnel.
